



If we are substantive Christians living intentionally with the kingdom of God in mind:

(we are usually super predictable)



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Most of the time we fall into 2 categories:

- 1. Enjoy being impressed (wanting then to make an impression)
- 2. Enjoy being impressive (wanting to making an impression.)



Doug Pennington (2004):

It is our job to see them as human beings, with all the similarities, conditions, hurts, experiences and strangeness that make up each one of us. It's normal to be impressed with what is impressive about a person, and vanity to try to impress them. But most importantly, you should always feel and treat their impressive qualities as secondary to who they really are- and be available to them in the place everyone else ignores, but that Jesus sees- their real humanity. Always remember, their most common place is their most important one.

What's true about *people*

is true about *culture*

And *everything else* that is "impressive"

(school and office mates, parents/children, church, city, neighbors, fellow parents, or vague sense of "Americanism")


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
How we React

Reaction: "Greatly distressed...the city was full of idols." vs. 16



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

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
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
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How we Respond

2. Jesus should dramatically change our response to impressive things

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Faithful Response

Grace and truth: "contextual witness."

Gracious Hospitality: means caring about your guest's condition and feelings, and then tailoring your action as a host to make them feel welcome, comfortable, safe, and that they belong.

Gracious Witness: means understanding another person's thinking, what they assume and what they find believable and why. Then hospitably welcome them to the truth

Context MUST lead to witness


