



FC Baur said certain statements in Acts "can only be looked at as intentional deviations from historical truth in the interest of the special tendency which they possess."

Adolf von Harnack called Acts both a "great historical work" and that Luke "affords gross instances of carelessness, and often of complete confusion in the narrative."



#### Luke 1:1-4

Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, 2 just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eyewitnesses and servants of the word. 3 Therefore, since I myself have carefully investigated everything from the beginning, it seemed good also to me to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, 4 so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught.

"In ancient works, concerning multivolume works, the preface of the first was the preface for the whole- and Luke claims to have been careful in his investigation in writing so as to make his work trustworthy, and to afford the reader certain knowledge. Luke claims that the events are historical. Luke claims that he got his information from eyewitnesses. Luke claims his writing was the result of his own personal research. His research included both those who had done extensive personal research, and who were themselves eyewitnesses. He makes clear that the result of reading his work is meant to create legitimate certainty about the things we have been taught.

There are numerous reasons to expect Luke to be a reliable source: Luke was himself a doctor – someone who'd gone through rigorous empirical training. He was profoundly literate- his stylish Greek is one of the most complex in the
